# VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

Violence against women affects all communities regardless of class, race or culture. The United Nations Declaration on the Elimination of Violence Against Women<sup>1</sup> defines violence against women as:

"physical, sexual and psychological violence occurring in the family and in the general community, including battering, sexual abuse of children, dowry-related violence, rape, female genital mutilation and other traditional practices harmful to women, non-spousal violence and violence related to exploitation, sexual harassment and intimidation at work, in educational institutions and elsewhere, trafficking in women, forced prostitution, and violence perpetrated or condoned by the state."

# VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN IN THE SOUTH EAST

In 2013/14, there were more than **15,000 CALLOUTS** to family incidents in the South East region. Police callouts to family violence incidents in the South East have **DOUBLED** over the last decade<sup>3</sup>. The actual figure is likely to be much higher as **58%** of women who have experienced violence have never contacted police<sup>4</sup>.

Violence against women is serious, prevalent and driven by **GENDER INEQUALITY**.
